MHC received twenty-one (21) ESG applications in the 2024 funding cycle. Sixteen (16) applications met all requirements and are being recommended for funding.

Program Information

The projects recommended for funding will provide services to 1,701 households in Mississippi through the ESG program. Services would be provided to those experiencing homelessness and at risk of becoming homeless. The activities are consistent with the State's Consolidated Plan. The average ESG funds invested per unit of services is \$1,252.

The purpose of the Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) program is to assist individuals and families quickly regain stability in permanent housing after experiencing a housing crisis or homelessness. ESG services are targeted towards those with extremely low income (ELI), households earning less than 30% of area median income. ESG provides assistance through the following components: Emergency Shelter (ES), Street Outreach (SO), Homeless Prevention (HP), Rapid Rehousing (RR), and HMIS data tracking. The State of Mississippi received an ESG allocation of \$2,302,659.00 for the 2024 grant cycle.

MHC will work with agencies not recommended for funding to help them build capacity for future funding.

Award Housing Opportunity for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA) funds to five (5) agencies totaling \$2,454,513.

Summary/Background

MHC received five (5) HOPWA applications in the 2024 funding cycle. All five applications met the requirements and are being recommended for funding.

Available Funds

Program Information

The projects recommended for funding will provide services to 534 households through the HOPWA program. In addition, services would be provided to those living with HIV/AIDS and impacted by HIV/AIDS and experiencing homelessness or at risk of becoming homeless. The activities are consistent with the State's Consolidated Plan. The average HOPWA funds invested per unit of services is \$4,596.46.

The purpose of HOPWA is to ensure that people living with HIV/AIDS can access and maintain adherence to necessary medical care and other services through assisting them with stable housing and related support services. HOPWA services are targeted towards those with low income (LI), households earning less than 80% of area median income. HOPWA provides assistance through the following activities: Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA), Short-Term Rental Mortgage Utility (STRMU), Permanent Housing Placement (PHP), Facility-Based programs, and Supportive Services. The State of Mississippi received a HOPWA allocation of \$2,721,765.00. The deadline for spending HOPWA PY24 funds is 2027.
